Parade begins sharply at 2:00 - so please be on time and get the "parade" on the "water"! Please allow space for boats to "do their magic" in front of judges, while not lagging too far apart - tricky!!



quickly for no obvious reason. As I watched, the threat of an Eagle was headed their way! From the far distance, it could not approach fast enough to get near the encircled chicks – they were safe!

ENVIRONMENTAL

Restorative Lake Sciences will be on Silver Lake on June 14th to complete the spring survey to record the locations of the Eurasian Milfoil (EMF), which will be treated Just before the start of July. The findings will be emailed to all the people who have given us their email addresses as well as posted on the Silver Lake Web Site. If your property is located at or adjacent to an area being treated, please refrain from swimming (humans and pets) for 24 hours after treatment, and watering lawns and gardens for 48 hours. All properties where treatments will be taking place will be posted the day of the treatment. We will do our utmost to notify by email and on the website the day that the treatment will occur. It is important that we do our best to continue to control the spread of the EMF.

The other two types of invasive species on

our lake are *Purple Loosestrife* and Phragmites (common reed). Even though these are not too prevalent and are located on or very near the shore, they will spread if not removed properly. If you have this *beautiful purple flower* on your shore, it must be pulled "by the roots and bagged", this invasive can take over a whole area of our letter.



take over a whole area of our lake in a short time!

Always check your watercraft before putting it into Silver Lake to ensure that you are not bringing any invasive hitch hikers into the lake. There are many other types of invasive species that are being introduced to Michigan inland waters. Let's not have our Silver Lake be one of them.

2018 SPRING DRAIN REPORT

Yes, in answer to your enquiries - the water level "is" indeed high on Silver Lake this spring! A very late spring snow followed by heavy rains has brought the lake level to well over the 862' high water mark! Steve Largent, our County Drain Commissioner, has been very active in keeping the drain clear of obstructions and the water flowing with the help of a couple of lake residents (thank you Al Strange and Nick Agostinelli!), and yes it was open all winter. Once the water level recedes Steve also has plans to pull the screen covering the drain for reassurance that the drain is functioning as designed without any obstructions.

"History - SLIA/Drain/Other Information" for a brief history on the drain as well as a few photos of various segments of the drain itself. The website also has a category "Newsletters". If you click on the Spring 2014 newsletter and scroll to the third page, there are 2 articles, "Too high or too low" and "History of the Overflow Drain", very informative about the ability of the drain to lower the water level. The keyword is "overflow" – many people think of a dam, rather than a drain – they do operate differently.

Do "take heart", it will go down, as it is designed to do, we must have patience! ... Hint, if you are landscaping or making changes to your shoreline, be aware that the water does fluctuate, leave room for it to do so.

This method worked magic on a skunk that took up winter residence in my crawl space one year, also good for your boat engine cavity when the muskrats are looking for a winter residence in the fall.
