Boat Launch Dredging Update

The SLIA, with the support of many of our members, has requested that the DNR boat launch be dredged. Over time the launching of boats has created a sandbar that makes it difficult to get boats in and out at times.

The DNR has the permit in hand (good for five years) to do the dredging, and the permit allows them to dredge to a depth of four feet. They are closely monitoring the lake level as it is currently more than one foot higher than it was last year at this time. The shallower the lake, the more effect the dredging will have. The DNR had planned on using mechanical means (front end loader) to do the dredging but now they also have a smaller hydraulic dredge which would do a better job, and that may be the

At this point I can't say they will definitely dredge this fall but they are monitoring the lake level. Once the decision is made to dredge, the launch will be closed for the work to be performed. When that happens an email will be sent to all that we have email addresses for to announce the launch closing.

Fall Alert! We have been advised that lawn services have been observed blowing leaves and lawn refuse into the lake. If you have a lawn service, or as a non-resident or rental unit owner, you need to employ one - PLEASE instruct them not to do this! If you see a neighbor or a lawn service raking leaves into the lake, take a minute - educate them!

Leaves in the lake = phosphorus = muck! Love your lake - Don't muck it up! ... purchase non-phosphorus fertilizer for your fall feeding (McGough's stocks it)

Next Cleanup Saturday, September 28, 2013

We clean up the road from US 31 to Silver Lake Rd. (approximately four miles). This usually takes 1 ½ to 2 hours. All volunteers must view a video on the Grand Traverse County Road Commission web site. After you reach the GTRC site, click on general>adopt-a-road>part 1 safety guidelines and part 2 danger on the roadside.

We will meet at East Silver Lake Park at 10:00 AM. Vests and trash bags are supplied.

Environmental Update

During the 2013 summer season, our lake was once again treated to control the Eurasian milfoil. There were approximately 15 acres that needed to be treated again this year. We will be going out again this fall to see how effective the treatment was for the 2013 season. There was some purple loosestrife and fragmites spotted in the late part of the summer, these will also be treated this fall.

We continue to make inroads on these invasive species through the treatment of the lake, which has been accomplished thru a joint effort of Garfield Twp., Blair Twp., and a small special assessment added to the taxes of the lake residents. The special assessment that has been in place will be running out this year and will need to be renewed in order to continue with the treatment for the next 5 years. I am asking that you support the township's in the passing of this assessment again so that we can continue to keep these invasive plants from gaining anymore of a foothold in our lake. I have seen lakes that have been taken over by Eurasian Milfoil. We would lose our entire shoreline to a depth of 20+ ft. depth of water if we fail to continue this important battle!

Muck Update

Phase 1 is nearing completion. Thanks to all of you who have helped in the process of measuring and recording muck levels. We can only assume, after the push this year, that those who have not responded do not have a problem with muck. If that is not true and you want your mucky lakeshore property to be included in our "Muck Map", you have until the end of this month (September) to get that info to us before we leave for the season. To receive a "Muck Kit", send a short email to me at dseeloff@gmail.com requesting one along with your name and lakeshore property address. I will get one out to you immediately! I do have 25 muck kits still out there that haven't made their way back to me. Did you just forget to send them in?

Moving on to Phase II - This phase will consist of taking all the data received and displaying it on a blueprint size "Muck Map". It will then be sent to the Federal "Clean Lake Program" along with a 1950's version of a muck map for comparison. Also in this package will be our "Muck Video" which we believe will show our need for financial help to clean up our beautiful Silver Lake. Watch





PRINGLE ISLAND ONE OF MANY "JEWELS" ON SILVER LAKE


We purchased a small blue cabin at 164 Roman Drive in 1989, but it wasn't until 2008 that the history of our summer residence surfaced. Our daughter was researching the Silver Lake area for a college course. As fate would have it, Ted Vaccarella, the great-nephew of the original owner, showed up at our door asking about a "little cottage." As a result of this chance visit, our daughter received many documents, pictures and historical information about the first resident of the island, Mr. George Pringle.

The following excerpts are taken from our daughter's research project, as well as additional information and photos from Mr. Vaccarella and Nancy Knight. We hope our Silver Lake neighbors enjoy reading about this special place!

In 1893, George W. Pringle came to this island in the middle of Silver Lake (that now includes our property). George was a

Civil War veteran of the Union Army, born in 1843 in Fairport, Town of Perinton, New York. According to his discharge papers, he enlisted for one year as a Private in Company H, 25th Regiment of the New York Cavalry on September 9, 1864. George was described as "... Five feet eight inches high, light complexion, blue eyes, light hair, and by occupation, when enrolled, a farmer."

Previous owners (if there even were any official owners) of the land are not known, but the land was used only for farming before Pringle came to the island, when it came into his possession as a grant from the government (This was a common practice at the time to award land for service). He built the first buildings on the Island, consisting of a single room home with an attached shed, an outhouse, and barn.



Island to his nephew Don Pringle, who continued work on the house and buildings. He officially came into possession of the island on March 29, 1922. Don's grandson, Ted Vaccarella, spent many summers at Pringle Island with his grandparents, and shares his personal account of Pringle Island and the progress of the house and property throughout the 1940's and 1950's.

TED WRITES: "On August 14, 1950, Stanley and Olga Mizner granted a 40 foot right of way to my grandparents via a Warranty Deed on August 16, 1950 – this is now Roman Drive. Before that time, access was by permission of the farmer who owned the land. During my visits there were only farm fields bordering the access road.

In 1948, my folks, my brother, and I vacationed on the island. On arriving at the edge of the lake from E. Silver Lake Road, we found about six inches of water across the sand bar roadway. We got out and my parents decided that the gravel was firm enough to permit our 1938 Chevy to cross!

Then, as now, it was a fairly steep climb from the shore up to the island plateau. The main road turned left at the island shoreline, past Campbell Island on the left, then around to the cottage. After the right-of-way was obtained in 1950, my grandfather did some work on the access road, paying about \$1000 (quite a bargain by today's standards!) to have electrical poles and electricity brought in to the cottage and barn."

MIKE CONTINUES: The house and property on Pringle Island has been passed through a number of owners, including the Roman, Fisher, Greenlee and Bol families. The Greenlee family was noted for painting just about every part of the house green! We purchased the house in 1989 from the Fisher family. The cottage, except for the addition

of another bedroom and slight updating of the electrical and plumbing system, was essentially unchanged from what George Pringle had built. However, in 2005 we made the decision to demolish the 112 year old house. Upon demolition, we recovered several stacks of newspaper that were used by George to insulate the house (also a common practice of the times). The papers used for insulation were titled "The Chicago Record" and most were dated circa June, 1896.

Today, we've built our retirement home on the exact location of the original one room cottage, and are privileged to have many artifacts from the Pringle cottage saved as momentos!

There are so many great stories of the properties, people and families who have called Silver Lake home over the years, we would be very interested in your sharing yours with us for the newsletter. You can write

"KEY-HOLING" WHAT IS IT?

Key-holing is allowing people, who don't own property on Silver Lake, to moor several boats on one dock with minimal lake access. (Note, this does not mean one family with more than one watercraft, but the misuse, even to the extent of renting slips as has happened on other lakes) This could potentially create a safety issue with more boats than Silver Lake can safely handle.

Scot Ogden and I met recently with Pat Pahl, supervisor of Blair Township, to discuss key-holing on Silver Lake. Pat was very receptive, and has agreed to see that we are on the agenda with the Blair Township planning commission to present our concern. We believe that Garfield Township will follow suit with any regulation that Blair implements We will continue to update you via email and the spring newsletter regarding our progress.
